Aura Hall Celebrates its Centennial by Liisa Silander

This year FAHS's neighbors in Voluntown—home to eastern Connecticut's other Finn hall—are celebrating Aura Hall's 100th anniversary with a series of events to honor the people and traditions that have shaped us over the past century. And unsurprisingly, many of these people have been supportive of both halls throughout their respective histories.

In 1923, the group in Voluntown got off the ground when 10 families of Ininah Immigrants gathered at the farm of loel and Hilda Villanen (aka Williams) to form an agricultural cooperative they called Aura Seura (litterally, "Plow Association"). Together, these founding members worked to create a better life in their newly adopted country by buying backs such as took, equipment, seed, fertilizer and grain in bulk and dividing the cost among themselves. They invested in a small building in town to serve as a central store for the co-op, but once roads improved enough to allow for direct deliveries to the members' farms, that building morphed into a "half" or community center for social activities.

"Now, our board and a few other core members have planned Aura's 100th anniversary season as a way to reflect on the half's origins and recognize the deep Finnish roots that still permeate this corner of Connecticut" notes President Tom Rutherford, who has helped lead the organization for the past quarter century.

Finnish Culinary Delights 2023 = Karjalanpiirakka 101 by Patti Folsom

Culinary Delights is traditionally one of the more popular events at the Finnish fall and this year did not disappoint! Co-chair Minna Waters and I decided to do something new and focus on new food litems. Karjalongiirokkos (Karellan Pies). We selected the title "Karjalongiirokkos 101" for the program after realizing that Karjalongiirokkos are such an iconic food staple in Fisiland we could teach an entire class about them.

Minna opened the program by greeting the audience members who filled the upstairs Ind. She introduced Anlta Smilley, who gave an informative slide show on the history of karjalonjairokkos and their popularity in Finland. Anlta told us they are exten as a part of breakfast, lunch, or dinner and are readily available in most grocery stores. She also talked about her experiences with members of her Finland tours who had the opportunity to try their hand at making kinjloinjairokkos. The slides she showed of their finished pastrise brought quite a few chuckles from audience members. But Anlta emphasized, "They may not look pretty, but they're still delicious!"

Also eliciting some good-hearted laughs was Anita's tutorial in how to pronounce

Kar-ya-lan-pil-rak-ka along

Kar-ya-lan-pil-rak-ka along with the essential rolling of the R's. She had the audience in stitches as they repeated the word four or five times, but they were pronouncing it perfectly by the end of the lesson.

Minna then took center stage to show how to make the rye dough, rice porridge, and egg butter for her "Kpies," as she likes to call them. And, for something new this year, a table was set up below

Havis Amanda statue in Helsinki to undergo renovation

A significant change is being undertaken in Helsinki. The tremendously popular 115-year-old Havis Amanda statue, located between the Eplanade Park and the market super-fort, will be receiving a complete renovation, starting in May 2023. Havis Amanda is one of the main attractions in Helsinki, and it's safe to say that everyone who has visited the market square by the harbor has stood and admired the Havis Amanda statue, one of the symbols of Helsinki.

The naked mermaid status is especially noted for the attention it draws every year on the eve of May Day, "Vappu," April 30. During a gala ceremony at 6 p.m., selected university students climb to the top of the statue, currently done with the aid of a car lift, to place a white student cap on her head. The raucous party draws quite a crowd, complete with drinks in hand and a bit rowdy at times. It has not been determined how this celebration will occur in 2024 since the tarseted completion date is Ausust 2024.

Since capping ceremonies over the years have caused stress and damage, renovations will include a permanent system to allow for these ceremonies and maintenance work to continue without stressing the sculpture. The statue will be transferred to a conservation facility for repairs.

Elections in Finland

Finland's Prime Minister Sanna Marin, of the Social Democrat Party (SDP) on Wednesday, April 5, officially submitted her government's resignation to President Sauli Ministo Tollowing the recent elections. As is customary, the outgoing government steps down after an election to make way for a new administration. Marin also announced that she will not seek re-election as chairperson of the Social Democrats in September.

The National Coalition Party, led by Petterl Oppo emerged as the winner of the elections and is now in the process of forming a new government. The formation of a new government in Finland is a crucial process that will determine the country's direction and priorities for the future. With the National Coalition Parry and Petterl Orpo leading the efforts to form a new government, the country is anxiously anticipating the coalition that will emerge and the policies they will prioritize.

Finland approved for NATO membership

Turkey's parliament voted unanimously on March 30 to formally approve Finland's membership to NATO, marking a historic step for the traditionally nonaligned Nordic country. Finland shares an 830-mile border with Russia.



A few months prior to Russia's invasion of Ukraine, in October 2021, Finnish popular support for joining the alliance was at 24 percent, according to local polls. By November 2022, it had soared to 78 percent. Every NATO member country had to vote approval of Finland's membership, and Turkey is the last country to do so.

Russian President Vladimir Putin and Kremlin officials have warned of "consequences" if Finland and Sweden join the alliance, though they have not specified what those consequences may be.

One of my favorite Finnish Items is a white porcelain sauna bird, a Riekko (willow ptarmigan), that came from Kutilla, a small town north of the Artic Circle. She now hamps on a chain above rocks in my sauna. Unfortunately, they are no longer produced making mine even more treasured. If first aw one at cousin Fija and Osaf's sauna, Osaf grinned as he poured some water in and carefully coaxed her into action. She was given a gentle push. Riekko rocked while the water trikkeln green for rocks.





Several Christmases ago I opened a present from my cousins In Latillia. Each year they send me agift that is unique to Finland. This particular time I found a white sums bird. Soon she was hanging in her new home in our sauna. Watching her rhythmic swaying has a satisfying calming effect adding to relaxation one looks for in sauna. The gentlet stem lulls me into a mental state where I can feel the tensions of the day slowly fade away. It is the opposite end of the spectrum from the big scoop of water hastly thrown on the rocks producing a blast of steam.

My cousin, Jenny Dillman, and I found ourselves bouncing around in the backseat of my grandmother's red and white Plymouth during the late 1950s. Dismissing the china, gionning the steaming coffee and sugar cubes, I would gaze at the towering masterpiece at the center of the table. I sat just inches away from the mound of purfly, whipped cream topped with dark, ripe strawberries. Antla Smilley's mother's long knille smoothly silled through those sponge layers revealing the red juice and inches of whipped cream. When she placed a silice of cake on my plate, my body lurched forward; I was automatically dream to the summertime sweetness. I was lucky to be sitting at the table like an adult, drinking coffee and listering to Finnish words (which) I did not understand), but in my heart, I wanted to be a child who pluned the face into Mrs. Häkkliß is Finnish surprise.

FINNISH CREAM CAKE by Anita Smiley

1 c. cake flour 1 tsp. baking powder

1 tsp. vanilla (or orange) extract

1 c. sugar 3 large eggs (2/3 c.) 1/3 c. hot water

Prepare a 15 1/2 by 10 1/2-inch jelly roll pan. Grease the pan and then line the bottom with aluminum foll or baking paper. Preheat oven to 375°.

Sift together the dry ingredients and set aside. In a small mixer bowl, beat eggs until thick and lemon colored. Gradually add sugar, beating after each addition. Transfer to a slightly larger bowl, allend in, at low speed, hot water, a tablespoon at a time. Add vanilla. Slowly mix in dry ingredients, on low speed, its until lobater is smooth.

Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake (at 375°) until top springs back when lightly touched (12-15 min).

Loosen the edges and turn upside down on a baking rack or on a piece of baking paper sprinkled with confectioners' sugar. Carefully remove the folloop paper from the cale. Prepare a second cake in the same way and let both cakes cool. (For a smaller cake, cut the first cake in half and make two layers. Use half the amount of cream and berries.)

Whip one pint of heavy cream, with confectioners' sugar and a bit of vanilla for flavor and sweetening, until of spreading consistency. Have two containers of frozen strawberries thawed and at room temperature. Fresh strawberries or other berries can be used or a combination.

Place the first cake on your serving dish. Poke holes with a fork. Spread a container of thawed strawberries on the cake, including the juices. Spread whipped cream over the berries. Place the second cake on top and again poke holes with a fork. Spread a second container of strawberries on top and again cover with whipped cream. Place in the refrigerator for a while to let the juices penetrate the cake.

In a quiet but meaningful ceremony, FAHS members Richard and Robert Harmon were awarded Quilts of Valor on March 8, 2023, by Mary Brown, fellow wood carver, a member of the CT Piece Makers quilting group, and a volunteer with the Quilts of Valor Foundation.

The Quilts of Valor Foundation began twenty years ago from a dream Delaware resident Catherine Roberts had about a young man being comforted by a guilt. She had this dream when her son Nat was being deployed to Iraq and the message of the dream was for her to make a quilt because "Quilts = Healing"

So. Catherine made her quilt and took it to the Walter Reed Army Medical Center where she encountered Chanlain John Kallerson, Chanlain Kallerson, whose wife was also a quilter

understood the value of awarding quilts to veterans. He knew they carried a personal message of caring and that he and Catherine needed to continue giving out the hand-made quilts so they could spread the message to veterans even where "that someone cares "

The Foundation grew from Catherine Robert's home in Seaford, DF, to volunteer quilters in all 50 states. Over 340,000 quilts have been awarded since 2003. Each quilt takes about 10 yards of fabric and is made by a team. One quilter cuts the fabric and sews the pieces together to form the quilt top. Another volunteer quilts the top by hand or by use of a "longarm" quilting machine. The final volunteer sews the binding.

Mary Brown, who has been carving with the FAHS wood carving group off and on for a number of years, nominated Richard and Robert as recipients of the Quilts of Valor award, Richard, a Marine veteran, received a patriotic-themed quilt. Robert, an Air Force veteran, received a travel-themed quilt. Mary chose the fabric for their guilts and sewed the binding on each one.

On the day of the award ceremony Mary was assisted by fellow wood carver John Harris, an Army veteran and also a previous Quilts of Valor recipient. As Mary and John draped each brother with their quilt. Mary proclaimed, "Thank you for vour service sacrifice and valor "

Maintenance updates

Required well testing

Thank you to Trustee Stan Karro for coordinating the required annual testing of the well at the Finn Hall which involves some preparation, treatment, and coordination with the Health Department. We received the report on March 20, 2023, that the well passed testing and is cleared for use until March 2024.

Landscaping

FAHS membership gives a huge shout out to Katrina and Steven Bousquet and the Lawn Science/American Landscape crew for



recent work at the Hall. The Barbeque pit has been rebuilt next to the outdoor stage, leveled and is ready to go for the upcoming Chicken BBQ on May 13°. The crew made some landscaping changes to the driveway for improved visibility and refreshed the mulch on the beds.



Window and railing repair/fundraiser

President Steven Bousquet is negotiating with contractors to replace windows and repair the window frames, some of which are in total disrepair and in need of renovation. Fundraising has been successful and the project should be starting this spring. The Board is discussing how to maintain the historical designation of the hall.

FAHS recently received guidance from Rachel Carley, the author and consultant who drafted the Connecticut Finnish immigrant document supported by a grant from the state of CT. This publication focused on fastern Connecticut. She reminded FAHS that we are in the Registered Historic Villago District which makes us eligible for grants from the State Historic Preservation Office. She suggested a circuit rider from Preservation Connecticut which is a free service. Rachel recommends matching the original windows if possible. We need to consult with this organization for both windows and canoor vealexement to allow us access to obtential matching errant funds.

Front door Canopy

Recent contact with a member who is a retired engineer may be an excellent option for the canopy project for construction and leadership.

Heating Ducts

Hall heating duct vent controls need repair or modifications. A mild winter and careful member monitoring of heat has resulted in less consumption than prior winters, but the expense may be similar due to the increased cost of fuel.

Sauna Stove

The sauna stove has been cleaned and restored, just in time for spring and summer events!
