#### Celebrating Juhannus and the Buffington's Send Off By Saul Ahola

FAHS celebrated Juhannus this year with an evening of camaraderie and traditional Finnish dance music sponsored by the Makipuro Arts Fund. Popular accordionist Ed Hendela travelled from his home in the Pennsylvania Poconos to join with Hannu Makipuro in a reprise of their many performances together for dancing at Finnish Halls' dances from Saima Park to Lake Worth and Lantana back when Ed was living in West Haven. On this perfect midsummer evening the Canterbury hall resonnded with Ed's accordion as he played familiar Finnish polkas, schottisches, waltzes and even tangoes. He was often joined by Hannu playing trumpet, singing or adding nercussion





A buffet of pulled pork (slow roasted with Stan Karro's secret rub), burgers (grilled to perfection by Steve Bousquet) an assortment of salads and baked beans, and a few Finnish dishes like karjalanpiirakka, kirkkusalaatti, and makkara kasvispata (a reprise of Jonathan Audette's recent "Finnish Culinary Delight") were enjoyed. Most chose to top off the meal with some of Sue Coupe's home brewed sima. During the buffet while Ed and Hannu took a break Kasha and Bob Breau on kantele and flute and Saul Ahola on fiddle iammed together playing a few more schottisches and polkas so the music never really stopped.

The midsummer celebration provided a perfect

opportunity for all the friends of Ellen and Don Buffington to toast them as they are leaving the Layonius farm in Canterbury, where Ellen grew up, and moving to the mountains of Colorado. Steve Bousquet thanked both of them for their years of friendship and contributions to FAHS, gave Ellen a Lily of the Valley pin and presented Don with an official "Galvanized Finn" certificate; Sue Coupe then presented Ellen and Don with the friendship/signature quilt she created which contained signatures from their many FAHS friends. It will be perfect for those cool Colorado mountain nights. Before the couple carved up their special cake. Anita Smiley helped everyone recite the cake's inscription: "Onnellisuutta tuleville vuosille--Happiness in the coming

On Saturday, April 20th, the Finnish American Heritage Society hosted the quarterly Last Green Valley Historical meeting. TLGV (www.thelastureenvalley.org) organization is a National Heritage Corridor that is comprised of 35 fowns and cities in Eastern Connecticut and South Central Massachusetts. Members of the heritage society provided an overview of the Finnish Hall history and also of today's heritage society origins. Tours of the museum and archives were provided along with updates on current activities of interviewing senior members of our organization and plans for cataloging the archive collection and an update on arts and music at the hall. We acknowledged the support for the heritage society over many years from the local community, grants from FFN, TLGV, local banking institutions, and the many years of support from

many of our members in the preservation of our organization. The group was entertained by Kasha Breau

and several kantele students and by Clare Zuraw on the jouhikko stringed instrument from the University of Connecticut and Upper Michigan. The kitchen staff provided Finnish oven pannukakku, pulla, salmon chowder, and coffee for refreshments.

We thank the kitchen staff, Anita Smiley, Saul and Sandra Ahola, Ellen Buffington, and many others who helped make this educational and historical program a success for our visitors. Finland Comes To Pomfret Community School By: Sandra Ahola, Former Principal of Pomfret Community School when the Cultural Arts Program was launched many vears ago.



Have you ever wanted to share your Finnish heritage with young children and promote Finland? Well, several members of FAHS answered the challenge and agreed to participate in a weeklong series of activities in May at the Pomfret Community School (PCS), a preschool through grade 8 program of almost 400 students. For over 25 years the school conducted a "visit" to another country, another culture, and this year it was Finland. The assumption was that since there is a local, active group of Finns, maybe it's time they shared their culture. Frank Aleman, a PCS grandfather volunteered his time to help coordinate this task.

Planning this event was long and time-consuming, but that didn't deter the FAHS members – Anita Smiley, Katharine Leigh, Stan Karro, Arlene Baril, Saul Ahola, and Sandra Ahola – from attending many meetings, sharing thoughts, brainstorming, and through it all trying to focus on how this would engage children and inspire them to appreciate and be aware of another culture right in their own backyard. "Ask Me About Sisst?" pins were made especially for this event and worn by the teachers to promote a new concept. And, of course, every educator loves the idea of Sisu as it applies to learning! At the end of the week during one of the assemblies, one student shouted out that Sisu meant "Never Giving Up!" Success!





Anita Smiley kicked off the week with four consecutive PowerPoint presentations that focused on Finland - the country, the scenery, customs, cultural differences, and education. The students all loved it (as did the teachers) when Anita told them that a Finnish school day consisted of 45 minutes of class 15 minutes recess outside 45 minutes of class, 15 minutes recess outside, repeat all day. Several docent presentations followed through the week and included Katharine Leigh focusing on her design, arts, architectural highlights, and baking a lingonberry & cardamom cake. These were well received, especially using Finnish Math as you bake a cake - it was vummy! Stan Karro shared his love of Finnishness in several classes, Saul Ahola presented an explanation of Finnish Independence and (of course) he included the music of Sibelius' FInlandia, which was heard throughout the middle school, and though rousing it didn't prevent one 7th grader from falling sound asleep! 
Hawes was back in familiar territory as a retired 8th grade teacher as she and her daughter, Liz, described the sauna and its role in the Finnish family. Arlene Baril dressed in traditional clothing and shared children's stories from Finland. Laura Sasser-Cuff and her mother, Marita Sasser, made the rounds in several classrooms and presented the Finnish language including how to count to 10. At week's end, many children were able to share words in Finnish! To top it off, Roy Tapio and John Harris, woodcarvers, were there for one day demonstrating their craft and explaining to these youngsters what woodcarving is all about. Additionally, there were some local parents who offered presentations to the classes on various topics.



On Wednesday the group held a tori, or a marketplace: the kantele was demonstrated by Rita Kelly and Saul Ahola; Finnish design, buildings, traditional clothing was shown by Anita and Arlene, the sauna was explained by Dianne, baking pulla was demonstrated and the children were given the chance to make braids, all were given samples of pulla to taste, with Sandra Ahola and Marja Leena Huhta assisting. And the PTO offered an art activity that included making a sample picture of the northern lights and a bookmark that included a painted Finnish flag, which incidentally, flew all week in front of the school.



The week concluded with 3 assemblies that included musical presentations by Kasha Breau on the kantele and her group The Wild Notes, and demonstrations by the Revontulet Dancers from northern Massachusetts and New Hampshire



Overall, many thanks to the committee who gave much to this week, especially Katharine Leigh who oversaw many extra details such as ordering and presenting books to the PCS Library for reference and often inserting her creative skills into the event. A magnificent exhibit was prepared by Katharine and Anita and was on

display in the school foyer for several weeks. And, Saul Ahola who along with Kasha Breau prepared

an 8-minute video on the kantlele for the music teacher to show to all the students before the week began. PCS students participated through their art club work, their computer classes, and completed several posters and large murals for display as well. Overall, it was a resounding success for all involved. The PCS students indeed became aware of many facets of the Finnish culture and the country and the FAHS members carried out their mission of sharing their culture with the local communities.

The 2018 FinnFunn Weekend was held at East Hill Farm, a working farm located at the base of Mount Monadnock in tranquil New Hampshire. The Inn provided a relaxed atmosphere, with multiple areas for activities, movies, Finnish crafts and quiet conversations. The weekend featured 15 presenters, 6 performances, 4 movies, 23 vendors at the Tori Market and a wide variety of donated silent auction items. There was even a Marimekko quilt raffle, of a Marimekko quilt that was made and donated by Sue Coupe! All participants enjoyed wholesome, delicious home-cooked meals three times daily, served family style: especially homemade pulla bread, plentiful coffee, and hearty country breakfasts. No one left the table hungry!

Highlights of the presenters included the keynote address by James Ford Cooper, the Finlandia Foundation Lecturer of the Vera 2018 and his interesting discussion of Finlandia and the Cold War based on his book: On Finland Watch (1999) which drew on his five-year experience with the US Foreign Service at the Finnish Embassy in Helsinki. Frank Eld is passionate about locating, studying and preserving Finnish log samast throughout the US and Canada. He gave demonstrations in the Finnish technique of log construction at both the Farm and at the Tori. He travels in a mobil demonstration log cabin built in the bed of his pickup truck.

Other presenters discussed possible future startups in Finland (Andy Heimiluoma and Greg Smiley); the history of co-ops in the Northeast (Jim Kurtti and Roy Helander); Lark Leonard held two sessions on the traditional craft of Finnish straw plaining that was very popular; Elaine Moe demonstrated birch bark weaving; Kasha Breau held kantele lessons and Anneli Johnson & Elina Aarnio demonstrated and entertained us) with how to make a sandwich cake.

Wonderful musical performances were provided by Sara Pajunen, a fiddle player, and FFN Performer of the Year in 2015-2016; Bernie Nowak, Jr. played the accordion at the Farm and at the Tori; dance music provided by the group Oivan Ilo and dance performance with enthusiastic audience participation with the Revontulet Dancers (including our own Matti & Marcia Huhta).

The weekend included free time and bags of bread for feeding the friendly and enthusiastic donkeys and goats in the barnyard. What fun and are they noisy! And the view of Mt. Monadnock from the porches was breathtaking.
